Three Facts

There are three facts which, when accepted, will keep one's life on a proper course. They are: (1) This world is not our home, (2) life is, at the longest, very brief, and (3) only spiritual things are of real importance.

- (1) This world is not our home. "Love not the world" (1 John 2:15), "be not conformed to this world (Romans 12:2), "my kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36) are typical New Testament warnings not to become enamored with, or attached to this world. We are at best "strangers and pilgrims" (Hebrews 11:13) merely visiting with no provisions for settling in.
- (2) Life is, at the longest, brief. "Man that is born of a woman is of few days, and full of trouble. He cometh forth like a flower, and is cut down: he fleeth also as a shadow, and continueth not (Job 14:1, 2). Other Biblical phrases such as "a tale that is told" (Psalm 90:9), "swifter than a weaver's shuttle" (Job 7:6), and "as water spilt on the ground" (2 Samuel 14:14) are used to remind us that life is soon over. There is no power, no wealth, no doctor who can avert death. Shakespeare wrote: "By medicine life may be prolonged, yet death will seize the doctor too.
- (3) Only spiritual things are of real importance. The drive for money, houses, land, prestige and power consumes many. How foolish, since this world is not our home and we will be here for such a short time. Marshall Keeble was once given a tour by a very wealthy man. After showing all his great possessions the man said, "Well, brother Keeble, what do you think?" In his inimitable style brother Keeble replied, "God's going to burn it all up." ". . . the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up." (2 Peter 3:10)

In view of these three facts only one exhortation seems appropriate: "Prepare to meet thy God!" (Amos 4:12). Nothing else is nearly so important.
