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## **God Are You Listening?**

"Now unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think" (Ephesians 3:20).

Fifth, He is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think!

Paul, in writing by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, could have just penned that God was able to do what we ask or think, but he did not. The intensity behind his words cannot be overlooked — they are there for a purpose. God wants His children to be overwhelmingly convinced that He is available in our time of need — never doubting His promise to answer our prayers.

What a marvelous privilege it is to pray to our heavenly Father, knowing that He is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think! This thrilling verse ought to serve as a great motivator for all of us to continue praying frequently, fervently and faithfully believing that God will bring it to pass (Romans 12:12; James 5:16; 1 John 5:14). Yes, God is listening, and yes, He is answering.
