THE PRICE OF GOLD

Gold is becoming more expensive by the day. Currently, it has reached a record high of \$4,300 per ounce, making it one of the most valuable commodities in the world. Its rising value reflects, in part, the devaluation of the American dollar. Gold is used for currency, worn as jewelry, and even found in cell phones and computers because of its ability to conduct electricity without corroding.

When Paul warned that "the love of money is the root of all evil" (1 Timothy 6:10), he was also speaking of gold. Whether through deceiving someone with fake gold, stealing it, or killing for it, "gold fever" has been a recurring "sickness" throughout history and across the world.

In Scripture, there are three important truths to remember about gold in our current climate:

- 1. No amount of gold is as valuable as one's eternal soul. Jesus said, "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? (36) Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Mark 8:36-37).
- 2. No amount of gold can pay the price of redemption from sin. 1 Peter 1:18-19, "know that you were not redeemed with corruptible things, like silver or gold, from your aimless conduct received by tradition from your fathers, (19) but with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot." The word redeemed carries to the idea of being bought out of slavery. Sin enslaves (John 8:32-35; Romans 6:16-19). And no amount of gold can buy ourselves out of our sin problem. A rich man cannot hand over all of his gold on the Day of Judgment in hopes to gain eternal life. The only one who could buy us out of our slavery is the sinless lamb of God (John 1:29).
- 3. It's not as valuable in Heaven. When John wrote about the beauty of Heaven, he described the things he saw in the best of terms we have here on earth. So even though he may not have been literal, he wrote, "the street of the city was pure gold, like transparent glass" (Revelation 21:21). In other words, in Heaven, the object people wear on their fingers and around in their neck, is the pavement walked upon.

Gold does have value here and now; yet nothing in comparison in the life to come. Remember, Jesus said, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal; (19) but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. (20) For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matthew 6:19
