Honoring Mother In All Stages Of Life

We need to honor her as she becomes a grandmother and greatgrandmother. "Do not despise your mother when she is old." (Proverbs 23:22). We have our own families, but we are not to forget to honor our mother. And that honor is defined as providing what we can to meet her needs. Honor at this point might come to mean helping her adjust to new living arrangements, treating her with dignity, accepting responsibility for her, patience and understanding. It may mean communicating to her, "I will honor you by doing what is best for you" even if these decisions are difficult ones - for her or us.

We need to honor her even if she has already died by being what she taught us to be, like being honest or being obedient to God
