One of the most vivid images in the Bible is what we read of in Psalm 119:105: "Your word is a lamp to my feet, and a light to my path." This presents a powerful picture, especially in the context of those who lived in biblical times.

In the times of the Psalmist, there were no powerful flashlights. The traveler carried a small oil lamp, whose flax wick gave off only a little light. There was enough to see by, but not enough to see very far down the path. There was basically just enough to take the next step or two without stumbling or falling.

What an appropriate reminder for us. The Word of God is a lamp to our path. It doesn't illuminate far into our personal future, but it does shine in our present. God's Word gives us the light to take our next step in life – and that's all we need to keep from stumbling.

If we fill our minds, hearts, and lives with God's Word, we will always have the light we need to know what we must do next.

In Times of Stress



In Psalms 56, we read David's words during a time of extreme stress. There came a time when the young warrior was captured by the Philistines in the area of Gath. You will recall that David defeated and killed the Philistines' beloved warrior, Goliath, in battle (1 Samuel 17). Goliath's hometown was Gath. You can imagine that this was a place where David was most hated. David

gives us an idea of how dangerous this area was to him: It was there that David was being hunted down (Psalms 56:1-2); David's enemies were spreading lies about him (Psalms 56:5); and they were constantly planning and scheming to destroy David (Psalms 56:6).

In the midst of all this stress and fear, David makes this amazing declaration of faith: "When I am afraid, I put my trust in You ..." and "... in God I trust and am not afraid. What can man do to me?" (Psalms 56:3,11).

David knew that by actively choosing to trust in God, one can overcome fear and find peace even amidst the most difficult circumstances. So, whenever you are feeling anxious or threatened, turn to prayer and trust in God's protection.
