## **Choose The Right Way**

Over a century ago, Robert Frost wrote a poem called "The Road Not Taken." This poem is often recognized by its last three lines,

"Two roads diverged in a wood, and I — I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference."



In Jesus' parable in Matthew about the wide and narrow gates, Jesus asks us to think along these lines as well. While Frost alludes to making a valuable life choice that seems to have worked well for him, Jesus speaks to us about the ultimate choice. Some people say, "What is popular is not always right, and what is right is not always popular." Jesus says this exact thing when He tells us to be righteous and follow His way rather than the way of the world. While it is easy to follow the way of the world, we will one day pay dearly for it. Just as Frost is thankful he took the road not taken, so should you be in choosing salvation and eternal life over death. Challenge yourself to give up worldly desires and take the road less traveled through the narrow gate to life in Christ.
