"He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much: and he that is unjust in the least is unjust also in much." (Luke 16:10)

This text teaches a very simple truth, but one that many of us find difficult to embrace. Parents try to rear their children by such principles as be fair, honest, and dependable with life's nickels and dimes and then when they are adults they will be able to handle dollars the same way.

But what we fail to recognize is that as adults most of our lives are also made up of nickels and dimes - small things. Not many of us will write a book, be appointed to a president's cabinet, dine with a queen, or be burned at the stake. Likely, we are going to have only small opportunities like giving a cup of cold water, visiting a nursing home, writing a note to a lonely person, or speaking a kind word to a distressed and burdened soul. We may only render such service as kissing a child's skinned elbow or feeding the neighbor's cat.

Don't overlook the small things while waiting for some big thing that would prompt historians to style you as a great Christian. Don't yield to the temptation to be faithless in little while seeking to be faithful in much.
