There was "no room" in the inn and, so, the Savior of the world was born

in a stable? The words "no room" seem almost to have been a prophecy of what our Lord's life would be like in this world. Men an women have always had trouble finding room for the Son of God! Even today, Christ is still being excluded. He still finds Himself often on the



outside. The Innkeeper mentality is not dead. Consider some ways in which there is "no room" for Jesus.

- 1. No Room in Politics, Government and Business. Christ has been largely banished from the halls of government. The policies of our government are ot framed so as to reflect the teaching of Christ. In our country the principle of the "separation" of Church and State has been distorted to mean the total isolation of Christianity from the process of government. Nor is there any evidence of the influence of Christ in the boardrooms of our giant corporations! There is "no room" for Jesus in public life.
- 2. No Room in the Schoolhouse. Christ has been barred from the classroom. It is permissible to speak of Hitler or Napoleon or Stalin or other figures of history who have bathed the world in blood, but it is not permitted to speak of the Prince of Peace. The ACLU has repeatedly filed suit fo keep Jesus out of the school Christmas pageant. In their view, Karl Marx or Charles Darwin should be made welcome in our classrooms, but not Jesus Christ!
- 3. No Room in Many Churches. Modern religion is often embarrassed by Christ and His teachings. Liberal churches deny the virgin birth, the resurrection, or the divinity of Christ and feel no loyalty to His standards of morals and ethics. Many churches are more interested in social issues than the are in the atonement.
- 4. No Room in the Lives of Many Who Claim to Follow Him. Often there is little evidence of the compassion, mercy, love, and morality of Christ in the lives of His would-be followers. Christ should be more visible in our lives! (Galatians 2:20). Many call themselves Christians but can't make room in their lives for regular worship attendance, generous giving, Bible study, prayer and Christian service!

We live in a world which has veered frighteningly out of control. We are so advanced technologically and scientifically and yet our world is full of loneliness, heartbreak and sin! Is there any wonder ...? We have left Christ out of things! Life will always be empty and off course as long as we refuse to make room for Christ.
